Creating a Caricature

Creating a caricature is both an art and a science! It's about capturing the essence of a subject while exaggerating certain features to create a humorous or overblown effect.

Steps to Create a Caricature:

- **Observe Your Subject:** Start by closely observing the person you want to caricature. Note their most distinctive features—big eyes, a long nose, prominent chin, etc.
- **Sketch the Basic Shape:** Draw the basic shape of the head and the face structure. This could be a simple oval or another shape that matches the head.
- **Exaggerate Features:** Identify one or two key features and exaggerate them. For instance, if someone has a big nose, draw it even bigger.
- **Keep It Recognizable:** While exaggerating, ensure that the person remains recognizable. The caricature should still capture their unique likeness.
- **Add Details:** Once you've exaggerated the key features, add other details like hair, eyes, and mouth. Pay attention to expressions and emotions.
- **Finalize the Drawing:** Use bold lines to finalize the drawing and add any other details you want.
- **Transfer to your wood block:** You can re-create your paper drawing, or use transfer paper.



Tools You Can Use:

- Traditional: Paper, pencils, and markers.
- Digital: Drawing tablets and software like Adobe Illustrator or Procreate.
- Your favorite search engine or AI (like to one I used to create the image to the left, and to write this article.

- Practice makes perfect! The more you practice, the better you'll get at identifying and exaggerating features.
- Don't be afraid to have fun with it. Caricatures are meant to be humorous, so let your creativity run wild!

Tutorials & Courses

- Proko: Offers a variety of drawing tutorials, including caricature drawing.
- Draw with Jazza: Provides fun and engaging art tutorials, including caricatures.
- Udemy: Search for caricature drawing courses. They have both free and paid options.
- Skillshare: Offers a range of art classes, including caricature drawing.

Books

- "The Mad Art of Caricature!" by Tom Richmond: A comprehensive guide to drawing caricatures by a professional caricature artist.
- "Humorous Illustration" by Jack Davis: Provides insights into creating funny & exaggerated illustrations.
