Wood Carving - vocation or hobby ?

The term "whittling" comes from the Old English word *hwitlen*, which refers to cutting or shaving wood with a small blade. The practice of whittling is deeply rooted in traditional craftsmanship, and has been practiced as both a practical skill and a leisurely pastime.

Whittling doesn't require a large toolkit—but you <u>can</u> buy new tools every day for a lifetime. Here are the most commonly used tools: whittling knife / pocket knife, specialized detail knives, chip carving knives, hook knife, & gloves / thumb guards.

There are academic programs and degrees that you can pursue in woodworking, wood carving, and related fields if you like the idea of letters after your name. These programs often cover a wide range of skills. Here are some options:

- Associate's or Bachelor's Degrees in Woodworking: These programs may also cover digital design and contemporary woodworking techniques.
- Art and Design Degrees: Some art schools offer specialized programs in sculpture or fine arts that include wood carving as a focus area.
- **Trade Schools and Certifications**: Many trade schools offer certifications or diplomas in woodworking and carving, and can be a quicker path to mastery.

A degree in woodworking opens up a variety of exciting career paths where you can put your craftsmanship and creativity to work:

- Furniture Designer / Maker.
- Wood Carver / Sculptor.
- Cabinetmaker or Joiner.
- Woodworking Instructor.
- Luthier (Instrument Maker).
- Restoration Specialist.
- Set or Prop Designer.
- Entrepreneur or Business Owner.

In addition to traditional craftsmanship, many woodworking programs incorporate modern technologies like CAD (computer-aided design) and CNC machines, which can expand your opportunities into areas like manufacturing and product design.
