**Documenting Your Creations** 

You can show your creativity more effectively with the following picture-taking tips: Get the light right - The best lighting will NOT have glare, or harsh shadows. Best to have indirect sunlight or full spectrum light (not flash). An alternative to bouncing light from multiple directions, is to pass it through sheer white fabric from multiple directions. **Non-descript backdrop** – random, neutral tones work best because they will not distract from the subject. The flip side would be to consider an entertaining backdrop that provides drama and brings your creation to life – a picture or diarama.

Tripod-mounted camera - If you have something more than a point-and-shoot, set it to a slower *shutter speed* (1/30<sup>th</sup> of a second), low ISO (100), and small aperture (larger aperture number, like f11 or higher). And set the correct *white balance* for the light you are using (sunlight, incandescent, etc.). And if you have a macro lens, even better! Adjust the shot – if you have or software, you can make fine adjustments after the shoot. Many cell phones can get surprisingly good free apps like *Snapseed* or *LightRoom Mobile* for free.









# Tips, Tricks, & Trivial Ideas

#### New "Old Learning"

Some years back, carvers would make their own tools. Not only knives, but gouges also. If carpenter's steel was not on hand, a file might be or flooring nails (cut nails) was always a good choice.

I came across three cut nails, a perfect candidate for a new tool. Not much is needed for smithing a hammer, a piece of railroad track, pliers, torch, file, a can of water and you are all set to go. Heat the nail and start to forge till you get the shape you want. Then let it cool, clean and shape with the file. Clean and polish to your satisfaction. When it's to your liking. heat again and quench, check with the file for hardness. If the file cuts, it is too soft, if the file glides over the tool it needs to be drawn down this time with soft heat and quenched. Then a final cleaning and sharpening. Add a handle and give the new tool a test. This tool is #5 sweep 9/16, a nice size for my pouch. The only limit is your imagination or the supply of nails which will probably be the main limit.
