#### **More Durable Carvings**

Wood carved artifacts thousands of years old can be found in museums around the world, in spite of the limited durability of the medium. You may not aspire to have your creations last that long, but there are some things you can do to improve the durability of your pieces.

For one thing, you can think about the type of wood that you use – check out the chart below to compare the typical basswood and pine selection to other popular types of wood for carving. Another consideration is grain orientation.

wood type	Density	Flexural strength	
White Ash	600	103	
American Basswood	370	60	
Paper Birch	550	85	
Yellow Birch	620	114	
Black Cherry	500	85	
Sassafras	460	62	
American Sycamore	490	69	
Tupelo	500	66	
Black Walnut	550	101	
Atlantic White Cedar	320	47	
Ponderosa Pine	400	65	



#### **Grain Orientation for carving blank strength**

The type of wood you select to carve can limit your project. And the "grain" may be straight, interlocked, wavy or fiddleback, etc. – making it difficult to comply with the shape you want to make. It is smart to arrange the more delicate parts of a design along the grain instead of across it. Often, however, you may need to compromise, since a design may have multiple weak points in different directions, or orientation of these along the grain would necessitate carving detail on end grain. This is where you may need to assemble a carving blank out of many smaller boards. Them you can orient different areas of a block for 'carvability' and srength. It's also possible to find solid pieces of wood with divergent grain that fits your purpose - like using a forked branch for a bird's beak.
